

Case 134 - "Jessica"

Overview: Jessica's case is very instructive in demonstrating how few doctors in Australia are prepared to acknowledge vaccine damage, even when the facts are unambiguous. Such an attitude is of course not only unscientific, it is fundamentally dishonest. This case also shows how symptomatic treatment is often helpful, but not sufficient to finish off a case when the true cause of the disturbance has not been treated.

6.3.08 - 10.10am Jessica had 1st HPV injection in her left arm, and was put into a room for observation. She had minor shakes, then went back to her class. Her friends noticed tremors and insisted that she went to the school sick bay. She also developed a headache and nausea. 11.02am school phoned mother to advise that Jessica had an adverse reaction to the vaccines, and needed to be taken home.

11.30am mother signed Jessica out of school, and her hands were shaking uncontrollably, and she was feeling nauseous.

2pm Jessica saw a nurse at a medical clinic, who got a GP to examine her. The GP said he had never seen a reaction to a vaccine like this before.. He phoned the Children's Immunisation Clinic who said the symptoms were a reaction to the stress of having a needle, and not because of the vaccine itself. Jessica's mother was advised that the problem should not get worse overnight, but to bring her back if it did.

Later that day, Jessica's legs began shaking uncontrollably, and her body was almost convulsing. Jessica's parents took her to the local hospital at 6.40pm, who told them to give Jessica Panadol, and that reactions to vaccines occur within 15 minutes of the vaccines being administered.

10pm went back to the hospital as the shaking kept getting worse. A doctor eventually saw her and prescribed Diazepam and Panadol which were administered at 11.15pm. Home at 12.35 am

11.3.08 Jessica was brought for treatment by her parents. Her hands and legs were still shaking. She was anxious about her health because of the shaking.

Rx. Jessica was given 3 remedies. (1) Thuja 200 (*the only remedy with the rubric – shaking of extremities following vaccination*), (2) HPV 200, and (3) DPT M (the potency of the HPV vaccine was not available at that time, and the DPT vaccine contained some of the chemicals in the HPV vaccine).

17.3.08 Some improvement, followed by a worsening, gave (4) Thuja M, t.d.s.

4.4.08 (4) Thuja M had reduced the trembling. Ran out a week ago, and steadily worsened. Also complained of pains in her chest for 5-10 minutes. Rx (5) Thuja 10M b.d.

4.5.08 finally obtained a 200c potency of the Gardasil vaccine, and posted to Jessica.

Rx. (6) Gardasil 200. Take one dose and report

16.5.08, (6) Gardasil 200 reduced the shaking, but she has developed some burning in her knees.

23.5.08. Significant improvement.. Very occasional "shivers" lasting about half a minute, plus a buzzing feeling in her left shoulder.

30.5.08 Had a good week. Shivers down body. Give a triple dose.

16.6.08. Triple dose stopped tremors.
